Lending Library Content: SCATS has established a free of charge video and DVD lending library to assist Nevada employers in their safety and health training efforts. Videos and DVD's offered by SCATS are purchased from private production and service companies. While these companies strive to meet all safety and health regulatory requirements, there may be some inaccuracies. Ultimately, it remains the employer's responsibility to ensure that employee training is current and meets applicable federal, state, and local regulations.

Checkout Procedures: Videos and DVD's must be picked up and dropped off in person. When signing out videos and DVD's, the borrower must provide their name and signature along with contact information. Content may be previewed at any SCATS office prior to signing them out and advance reservations are not taken.

Restrictions: A maximum of three (3) videos or DVD's may be checked out at one time for a period of five (5) working days. Companies who charge a fee may not use the videos or DVD's, and borrowers cannot make unauthorized copies without obtaining permission from the production company. By borrowing a video or DVD from our library, a company also acknowledges its responsibility under the Federal Copyright Laws, and it accepts responsibility for any damage. Remember that videotapes and DVD's are heat sensitive so please don't leave them in an area where they are exposed to high temperature, such as in a car.
